We are pleased to announce that the WPATH Board of Directors has approved 5 student scholarships for those attending the 2018 WPATH Symposium. The student scholarships are in the form of registration fee waivers. More information on how to apply will follow.

WPATH Outstanding Student Contribution Award

Description: This award honors a graduate student or postdoctoral scholar who has made an outstanding contribution to the field of transgender health through scholarship, research, curriculum development, policy, or has demonstrated exemplary service to the World Professional Association for Transgender Health (WPATH).

Nominees: Please feel free to nominate graduate student(s) currently enrolled in a graduate program, or recently graduated student(s) who have made contributions in transgender-related program areas such as medicine, law, the social sciences, and other academic and applied disciplines, the practice of which contribute to the well-being of transsexual, transgender, and gender-nonconforming individuals, and to the field of transgender health. Self-nominations are encouraged.

Process: Please send award nominations by March 28, 2018 to the WPATH office at wpath@wpath.org SUBJECT: WPATH STUDENT AWARDS.

Nominations should include:

- a letter of recommendation (no more than 2 letters)
 - the nominee's CV
 - nominee's email address and/or phone number.
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Award Presentation: The chairs will notify the award recipient by April 25, 2018. The award, which includes a cash prize and complementary meeting registration, will be presented at the WPATH 2018 Symposium in Buenos Aires, Argentina, though individuals do not have to be present to receive the award.

Update from 2017 Student Research Grant (Runner-Up), *Ethan Cicero*

Contemporary, empirically-based knowledge of transgender health is scant and lacks understanding of physical health, health problems or impairments, chronic health conditions, and the impact of individual factors known to affect health outcomes in other vulnerable populations. Despite the growing body of health-related literature, additional research is needed to advance our understanding of the health among transgender subgroups such as transgender women (MTF), transgender men (FTM), and gender nonconforming (GNC) adults; moreover, this knowledge will help prioritize health needs, and identify pathways to reduce the health inequities plagued by the transgender population.

The overall goal of this study is to increase understanding of the relationships with individual factors (personal characteristics and socioeconomic position) and health status among five study groups: three transgender subgroups (MTF, FTM, GNC) and their cisgender male (CGM) and cisgender female (CGF) counterparts. The specific aims were to: (1) describe and compare the personal characteristics, socioeconomic position, and health status of five study groups (MTF, FTM, GNC, CGM, and CGF), and (2) determine the differential effects of individual factors on health status in the five study groups. The second aim allowed us to: a) evaluate differences in health status between the five study groups, covarying for the effects of individual factors and their interactions with study group, and (b) examine the influence of individual factors and their interactions with study group on health status.
